axis (ch. 4)	the center around which something rotates	Earth spins around its <b>axis</b> .
inexorable (ch. 4)	stubborn, can't be stopped	As Meg comes out of the first tesseract, she feels in tune with the earth including the <b>inexorable</b> tug of the moon.
ineffable (ch. 4)	strange and difficult to define	The <b>ineffable</b> quality of the beautiful location helps Meg calm down after her first tesser experience.
ephemeral (ch. 4)	lasting a short time	Meg describes Mrs Which's costume broomstick as <b>ephemeral</b> since it disappears quickly.
virtue (ch. 4)	being morally good	Even as a winged creature, Meg knows that Mrs Whatsit has <b>virtue</b> .
metamorphose (ch. 4)	change completely	Mrs Whatsit <b>metamorphoses</b> into a beautiful flying creature.
monoliths (ch. 4)	huge tall stones	Meg sees great <b>monoliths</b> while flying on the back of Mrs Whatsit.
protoplasm (ch. 5)	the living part of a cell	When Mrs Which lands on the two- dimensional planet, she forgets that the children's <b>protoplasm</b> is three- dimensional.
cosmos (ch. 5)	everything that exists anywhere	The fight against the Black Thing is being fought throughout the <b>cosmos</b> .
